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Leontief Medal Presentation to Ljubo Sirc



Hosted generously by the Business School of the University of Glasgow represented by the Head of the Business School, Professor Farhad Nourbakhsh (a former colleague), the Presentation of the Leontief Medal to Dr Ljubo Sirc took place in Melville Room in the beautiful Victorian surroundings of the University of Glasgow on Thursday, 12 May 2011.

Dr Sergey Vasiliev, of the Leontief Institute accompanied by his wife Marina, flew in from St Petersburg to make the presentation (pictured above). The Principal of Glasgow University, Professor Anton Muscatelli (a former student and colleague), came to offer his congratulations before the formalities began; the University was represented by Vice-Principal Professor Anne Anderson. Among the guests were family and many friends, including Susan and Nadia Sirc, Roger Clarke (editor of CRCE's Journal, Post-Communist Economies and former Glasgow colleague), Professor Roger Sandilands and his wife, Liza, Dr Eric Levin (another former student), and Lisl Biggs-Davison of CRCE.

Ministers and Massacres

Charles Crawford, who chaired the discussion at CRCE in March, writes:

"For many years I have been a friend of the Centre for Research into Post-Communist Economies, a sturdy enemy of collectivism based in deepest Westminster. They did fine work in mobilising anti-communist analysis and economic thought during the Cold War and thereafter.

This week they hosted a fine presentation and discussion led by Count Nikolai Tolstoy on the story which never dies, namely the ghastly circumstances surrounding the way British troops under the influence of Harold Macmillan handed over thousands of Russians, Yugoslavs and others to their doom through Stalin/Tito mass murdering.

Nikolai Tolstoy gave a powerful and moving account of his own long efforts to follow this story, which has taken him through a fearsome battle in the English libel courts and then the European Court of Human Rights through to the heart of the Soviet archives in Moscow (that name helped get him in!). Many of his suspicions about the actions and motives of key British and American officers involved had been confirmed in deeply buried Soviet secret documents".

Slovenian Nostalgia

In a letter to *The Times*, Ljubo Sirc wrote:

Sir: your report (April 4) greatly gives prominence to the shameful new Slovenian €2 coin honouring the communist partisan Franc Rozman ("Stane" was his partisan name, not his surname, as implied). Rozman is indeed widely held to have both ordered the execution of Democrats and to have killed some himself. The photo of him printed with the article shows him standing between a career officer on the left, and on the right, Viktor Avbelj, a general in the Slovenian Secret Police, who later became chief prosecutor in the infamous Nagode trial in 1947.
